## Phone-Free School

## Justification:

- Students could use them to cheat
- Students could access inappropriate information
- Students could engage in sexting
- Students could bully/harass others
- Usage distracts from the learning environment
- It is hard to monitor individual student usage
- Not all students have phones.



Phone use every day for longer than 20 minutes at a time leads poor sleep quality and duration.

Students who perform a task just in sight of their phone (regardless of if they are using it) do about 20% worse as it still distracts them.

In a survey conducted in 2001, no school banned mobiles. By 2007, this had risen to 98% and by 2012 some 50%of schools either did not allow phones on school premises or required them to be handed in at the beginning of the day.

Schools which restricted mobile phone use saw test scores improve by more than 6% in a year.

Pupils in schools with strict phone bans are  $\frac{2}{3}$  more likely to achieve five A\*'s to C grades at GCSE.

The effect of banning phones from school adds up to the equivalent of an extra week schooling over a pupil's academic year.
